

## THE PARISHES OF BRANDESTON AND KETTLEBURGH

Dear Friends

Events in Southern Africa and other parts of the world, and the impact of the global financial debacle on employment and even on retail institutions like Woolworth's make the likelihood of a "Happy New Year" seem slim for many people.

Yet, looking back to 2008 and forward to 2009, we have much to give thanks for and much to look forward to. Writing in the Parish Magazine of the Benefice of Campsea Ashe, Marlesford, Hacheston and Parham this month, Harry Edwards quotes the well known hymn:

“Lead us heav’nly Father, lead us  
O’er the world’s tempestuous sea;  
Guard us, guide us, keep us, feed us,  
For we have no help but thee;  
Yet possessing ev’ry blessing  
If our God our Father be.”

It is a good hymn to take with us into 2009, when, despite “the world’s tempestuous sea” on which we are voyaging, we will and do possess every blessing “if our God our Father be.”

Harry is encouraging us all to begin to work more collaboratively together across the seven parishes of the “Greater Benefice”. With this in mind we shall be exploring ways of harmonising services across the benefice. We shall try to provide, for example, at least one 8.00am Book of Common Prayer Holy Communion service in one of the seven churches every Sunday, and we hope to have a united “Greater Benefice” Service, along the lines of the one that took place for the first time on 30 November in Parham Church, as a regular event. It was an immensely encouraging service, a truly joyful way of celebrating Advent Sunday. The Church was full; both the choir and the bell ringers included representatives from all seven parishes; and the Rector’s punch after the service was the icing on the cake! As Harry says, “It was a vision of things yet to come. I am sure that worshipping together on a regular basis is the way a new benefice is born.”

We shall have to see, in the coming year, how we can make such a “drawing together” work, so that we become more aware of being members of a wider Christian family without losing our sense of neighbourliness amongst the immediate communities in which we live.

I hope 2009 will bring each of you great joy.

## TIMES PAST

Now that Red House Farm, Kettleburgh where Geoffrey Goddard lived, is for sale, it is intriguing to look at some of the families who resided there. The earliest one discovered was the Aldrich family.

In 1830 Elijah Aldrich, a widower, married Elizabeth Wroots, a widow at St Andrew's Church, Kettleburgh; they dwelt at the farm. The Framlingham Weekly News of July 2<sup>nd</sup> 1877, under the headline 'SUCCESSFUL CAREER OF A KETTLEBURGH BOY' quoted an article taken from a newspaper published in Bloomington, Illinois, USA of June 26<sup>th</sup> 1877.

It stated that members of the Aldrich family had joined the party from Kettleburgh who emigrated to Canada in 1830. Subsequently, one of the children, O.W. Aldrich settled in Bloomington, having in 1863, enlisted for two years in the New York Regiment of the Union Army during the Civil War.

Afterwards he became a preacher. He graduated as a B.A. in 1869 and in 1872 became an M.A., obtaining a Ph. Doctorate in 1875. In 1876 Dr O.W. Aldrich was elected to the Chair of Contracts in the Law Department of the Wesleyan University. In 1877 he was appointed to the Chair of Philosophy and German.

The paper went on to say:- 'He is a remarkable linguist, being proficient on Greek, Latin, Hebrew, German and French, all of which he has acquired to a great degree by self teaching. He is a modest student whose ability and character entitle him to the greatest admiration and who will be an honour to the vigorous institution of whose faculty he is to become a member.'

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In 1912 the property was bought by Ernest Walter Brown who rebuilt the farmhouse and renamed it the East Suffolk Game Farm. He began pheasant breeding but during the 1914 - 1918 war, was restricted to only 5% food for birds. Consequently he had only 20 pheasants left when the war ended. It took time to build up his business again.

Some people may recall the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition picture of 1936, 'Homage to A.P. Herbert' by W.O. Hutchinson (1889 - 1970), a scene at The Crown in Framlingham. Ernest Brown was among those portrayed by the artist, who later included the Queen, Prince Philip and the Queen Mother among his sitters. A copy of the picture, presented by Ernest Brown, hangs in the Framlingham Conservative Club.

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More people will remember Cecil and Ruby Randall who lived at Redhouse Farm from 1937 until 1990. Cecil came from a Charsfield farming family. His wife was a Framlingham girl, educated at Mills Grammar School and then Ipswich Art School. Both of them are buried at Brandeston.

Eventually we look forward to welcoming another family to the property.
