Dear Friends

If a season or a month is characterised by a sentiment, it seems to me that Spring – and specifically May – is the month in which HOPE is pre-eminent.

We are surrounded by a world bursting with growth and energy; plants grow with amazing vigour, the natural world is suddenly green, and animals of every kind are busy feeding or breeding. With Summer still before us, we all look forward, in the expectation of seasonal rain and sun, to harvest and maturity and the full ripeness that is to come.

This hope and expectation are given expression in our Church Rogation celebration, towards the end of the month.

Of course, this year, the first day of the month, May Day, comes only one week after Easter. So, this year, our Hope is derived from the promise of Easter when it is particularly fresh in our memories. It was this promise of New Life in the resurrection of Jesus Christ which energised and motivated Jesus' followers when they were "fired up" by the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

Also fresh in our memories at the beginning of the month is the Royal Wedding with all its splendour and celebration. Every wedding seems to me to be an expression of hope, not least this one. With so many expectations of this particular marriage, our Hope needs to be underpinned by prayer.

For the Christian, Hope is more than a vague sentiment. Our Hope is a gift of God's Spirit that grows out of our expectation that God will faithfully fulfil those promises made to us in and through and because of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. And like all God's gifts to us, Hope needs to be exercised, expressed and shared if it is to be of any use.

As we grow older, we face the temptation of looking back with "Rose-tinted spectacles", telling ourselves that things were (always) better in the old days, and leaving us disgruntled in the face of change. Well, we might "not know what things are coming to", but giving way to such a temptation can undermine Hope. In fact, Hope has the power to feed our own spirits with joy and assurance in life, and enables us to place our trust in God's providence and faithfulness. This Hope is not a "placebo", nor is it a confidence trick to persuade the gullible. Quite to the contrary, Hope overcomes fear, it feeds faith and empowers love.

As the poet, Robert Bridges, wrote:

All my hope on God is founded;
He doth still my trust renew.
Me through change and chance he guideth,
Only good and only true.

Surrounded by the physical beauty, joy and hope of Spring this month, may you feel the renewing and strengthening of Hope as you journey through life.

TIMES PAST

Recently a late 18th century family has been researched in the Kettleburgh and Brandeston records. It makes rather a sad story but unfortunately a true picture of that era.

Apparently from some time before 1747, Dennington owned 'Trust land' in Kettleburgh, which still belonged to them in 1839, when the Tithe Map was made. This land was close to The Chequers and beyond 'Windy Ridge' on the Easton Road.

The Dobson family originated in Rendham and Dennington, where Thomas Dobson had been the part tenant of a small farm. It is not known where they lived on their re-settlement in Kettleburgh about 1786 but they were very poor.

Before marriage at Rendham in 1779 Thomas Dobson and Mary Turner had six children with another six born in Dennington and Kettleburgh, two of whom died in 1790. They were so poor that Mary and the three youngest children, Daniel, Susan and Joseph were admitted to the House of Industry at Melton, later St Audry's Hospital. After 3 months Mary discharged herself but the three children, and eventually another brother, stayed at Melton until they were old enough to be apprenticed.

Nothing is known about Thomas until February 1800, when his body was found 'grubbing upon his knees', in a Brandeston field near Rose Farm, in Mutton Lane. It transpired that the previous afternoon Thomas Peck, a Kettleburgh farmer, had seen him close by. Dobson had told Peck that he had found some gin which they sampled together. Peck then left but Dobson knocked the bung out of one of the tubs, sat down in the ditch and drank 'out of the bung hole.' At the inquest Peck described him as being 'pretty forward in liquor.' A verdict of accidental death was given. Perhaps a smuggling route from Brandeston to Framlingham was to blame.

Meanwhile the Dobson children remained at Melton. At that time poor children were apprenticed to masters in their own village at the age of eleven; an apprenticeship lasting seven years. Tradesmen and farmers were forced to accept an apprentice unless they paid £10..0..0 fine to the House of Industry which was a lot of money then.

The two younger Dobson children, Susan and Joseph, were hard to place. Susan was first apprenticed to Jeremiah Wase of Kettleburgh Hall but he preferred to pay the £10..0..0 penalty rather than accept her. She was then apprenticed to James Keable, innkeeper of the Chequers but that did not work out. Three years later in 1803, her indentures were cancelled because of 'divers misdemeanours, miscarriages and ill behaviour,' particularly when she absconded for several days. A year later, in 1804 she was discharged to apprenticeship with John Smith, a Kettleburgh farmer... we know no more.

Joseph Dobson was also a problem child. He was sent first to Timothy Smith, Kettleburgh farmer, but returned after five days 'having wetted his bed.' Two more farmers paid the £10..0..0 fine rather than accept him. Melton tried placing him with a Woodbridge master but he preferred to pay the fine too. The Revd George Turner, Rector of Kettleburgh also refused him but at last, at the end of 1805, he was finally apprenticed to John Orford, the Kettleburgh watermill.

However the Orfords moved away in 1807 when Joseph would still have had about another three years of apprenticeship. Perhaps he went with them and made a success of his life. At any rate he earned some £50..0..0 which helped to fund the House of Industry. No more has been established about the family.
