PETER UNDERDOWN

Peter John Underdown born 7 April 1936 in Becontree

Son of Jack & Elsie

Peter had a loving happy childhood; he was born during the war years, the middle child of three children. Bringing up a young family in the middle of the London blitz was difficult. Peter's family were continually moving to avoid the worst of the bombing, but remained in London for the majority of the time. Peter, his mother and sisters would run to the nearby air-raid shelter and listen to the bombs exploding. Peter's father was away working, so his mother held the family together; she was an incredibly resourceful and hardworking woman. From a young age Peter took on the responsibility of supporting his mother, and looking out for his two sisters.

Peter's first job was with his father Jack, a fish monger at Billingsgate Fish Market, but he hated it. He quickly found himself another job, starting a 7 year apprenticeship as a trainee compositor, for a company based in Ilford, Essex.

Peter was a keen swimmer and cyclist. It was through friends at the cycling club that he first set eyes on June. They were married in Aldborough Hatch on the 8 June 1957, and have been utterly devoted to one another throughout their 57 years together. They settled into married life in Wiltshire whilst Peter carried out his National Service before returning to London where he was now a qualified compositor.

Angela was born in March 1961 at their first home. At this time Peter realised that a move into sales could be a wise one -he was a natural!!! After a move across the road to a bigger house with a very important garage, Allison was born, followed very quickly, one year later, by Michael; the family were complete.

Peter was in his element with his lovely young family, a gold coloured mark 1 Cortina with black vinyl roof, and a small printing press in the garage! That's where it all began. He was out selling during the day and printing in the garage through the night whilst still employed by Premier Press. Needless to say he soon got his marching orders. During this time he met his great friend and business partner Bob Cole and they decided to start out their own business, from a very run down shoe shop in Hackney East London. The business began to flourish, due to their hard work, effort, and determination. The children did not see much of their Dad during those early years; he was always at work. June played her part too; as well as bringing up the family, she was also the book keeper.

The London warehouse was beginning to have its limitations. In 1973 Peter and Bob became the owners of W E Harrison & Son (formally known as Ancient House) and ran both companies, but then came the three day week, putting enormous strain on the new organisation. Peter was determined to succeed, he was out selling and finding new business. The unions at this time were another challenge, but he was respected amongst the various union representatives, and even the most militant representatives came to enjoy their verbal contests.

During 1975 Peter and June moved the family to Sudbury. It was about this time Peter and Bob got into sailing and bought a boat; many fun days were had sailing along the coast, both families on board, but unfortunately most trips generally ended by being stuck in the mud, with Peter or Bob wading through waist deep mud to find help! This did not deter them, they decided to buy a larger boat from a Marina on the South coast, and the plan was to sail the new boat up to Wolverstone. A nervous June was reassured that all would be fine. All was well, until their rudder broke, followed by the engine failing, an off-shore storm started to build with the boat taking on water. Down to their last flare, things were getting desperate; fortunately that last flare caught the attention of the Frinton Life Boat. Peter was eternally grateful to the RNLI.

Peter and the business were now solely based in Ipswich. The East Anglian business began to flourish. By the early 80s Ancient House Press and sister company Monarch Origination were among the leading colour commercial printers in the country.

Family life was good too with lovely friends, exotic holidays, and the first family dog, Cassie. The family unit was extremely important to Peter, he was a great promoter of the FAMILY, a legacy that will surely live on through his grandchildren. Angela had become a qualified nurse, Allison had gone off to work in a London bank, and Michael was away at school when the move to Brandeston took place. Peter loved Brandeston; he loved the drive

down into Brandeston from Cretingham, often stopping the car to take in the view across the valley.

This move to Brandeston inspired him yet further, the largest move was yet to come. In 1985 he moved the entire production facility across Ipswich to the Hadleigh Road Industrial Estate. His mantra was "If we stand still we go backwards".

Family life was beginning to change. There were three weddings, all in Brandeston church, and seven grandchildren, all of whom were very much loved and cherished by Peter. He has, and will continue to have, a huge influence in their future lives.

Peter began to take life a little easier, enjoying walking the footpaths of Brandeston with his golden retrievers, taking on various projects around the home, and garden, but always keeping a watchful eye over the business. He had many interests, fishing, sailing, horse racing. He also decided to learn horse riding in his 60s, took up piano lessons, and even had a go at tap dancing! Peter enjoyed travelling, and has been fortunate to visit many exotic locations. He particularly enjoyed his many trips away with his close friends. It became a standing joke that Peter would move hotel rooms several times over the course of a two week break. He could be quite difficult to please!

But as time went on he would often say the best place on earth was Brandeston, evenings in the Queen's Head, gin & tonic in hand, chatting with his many friends in the village, Sunday roasts with all the family, spending time with his grandchildren, pottering in the garden, and being with the love of his life, June.

Peter will be greatly missed, he was a brilliant business man who has inspired many, a great socialiser and friend, a very loving father and grandfather, and a loyal devoted husband.

Alcinda reflects on what would have happened to her family had they not joined MST: "We would be working for survival, not for betterment."

What better way to promote the Christian Gospel?

MESSAGE FROM SUFFOLK COUNTY COUNCIL Programment of lead bug sorvings 112 / 114 / 115 / 116 / 118 / 1

Procurement of local bus services 113 / 114 / 115 / 116 / 118 / 119

Suffolk County Council, Passenger Transport is obliged to assess the need for local sponsored bus services. There are three route corridors contracts that are due to expire in August 2014, which is the end of the permissible period. Therefore, we are at the early stages of the tender process. The following services may have revised timetables:

- Contract 114 covers services 113 and 114 between Ipswich, Debenham, Thorndon, Eye and Diss currently operated by Simonds of Diss. The 114 contract is extremely expensive to operate and in common with all current procurement the amount of subsidy is being scrutinised and challenged by officers to secure better value for money. We will soon be reviewing several options for the continued provision of the service in the future.

- Contract 116 covers services 115 and 116 between Ipswich, Henley, Coddenham and Debenham currently operated by Galloway.
- Contract 118 covers services 118 and 119 between Ipswich, Framsden, Framlingham, Otley and Stradbroke currently operated by Galloway.

We would ask that these contents are forwarded to as many residents as possible . In addition, we would welcome any feedback and suggestions .

We will keep you informed in due course of further developments with the tender process and timetables .

There will be a separate e-mail issued regarding the sponsored bus service 482 between Framlingham, Stradbroke, Eye and Diss which is also due to be re-tendered for August 2014.

Floods report

Steve Mayhew, a resident of Harleston near Stowmarket has been volunteering as part of the Red Cross Emergency response team at the floods in the Thames Valley. Steve is a qualified volunteer ambulance crew member. Emergency response volunteers like Steve have been providing 24 hour ambulance support working with the South Coast Ambulance Hazardous Area Response Team:

"The HART team will get the person from the hazardous area and hand them over to a Red Cross crew who are manning front line equipped 4x4 ambulances. We were needed to not only crew the ambulances but to staff the control centres and work in rest centres."

"The British Red Cross is known for responding to international crises all around the world but I am proud to say I have been part of a major emergency response right here in the UK."

Appeal

Following the enormous rescue effort for people affected by flooding in the UK the Red Cross urgently need to raise funds. All funds raised in Suffolk will be spent on Red Cross services in Suffolk, and means we free funds up for the on-going flood crisis.

Some Red Cross history:

This year we are commemorating 100 years since the opening of the first temporary hospitals to help wounded soldiers returning from abroad. The hospitals were initiated by the Joint War Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St John of Jerusalem in 1914. There were 33 hospitals in Suffolk (listed below). The buildings varied widely, ranging from town halls and schools to large and small private houses. The most suitable ones were established as auxiliary hospitals.

Auxiliary hospitals were attached to central military hospitals, which looked after patients who remained under military control. In all, there were over 3,000 auxiliary hospitals administered by Red Cross county directors. They were usually staffed by:

- a commandant, who was in charge of the hospital (except for medical and nursing services)
- a quartermaster, who was responsible for the receipt, custody and issue of articles in the provision store
- a matron, who directed the work of the nursing staff
- members of the local voluntary aid detachment, who were trained in first aid and home nursing.

In many cases, women in the neighbourhood volunteered on a part-time basis, although the hospitals often needed to supplement voluntary staff with paid labour, such as cooks. Medical attendance was provided locally and voluntarily, despite the extra strain that the medical profession was already under at that time.

The patients at these hospitals were generally less seriously wounded than at other hospitals and needed convalescence. The servicemen preferred the auxiliary hospitals to military hospitals because they were not so strict. Also, auxiliary hospitals were less crowded and the surroundings more homely.
