SERVICES IN 2015

As part of our ongoing 'growing together' we will be experimenting with 3rd Sundays also being United services. They will move around all the seven churches as the 1st Sundays have for the last year or so, but not in the same order, and additionally the services will be at times to suit the 'host' parish, so that they have a different feel. For example, when a third Sunday service is at Easton it will be at 9am which enables people to get to the Sunday Cafe too. In Parham, it may well be at 11am to suit the later risers. Maybe in Kettleburgh it could even be an evening service, as their Choral Evensong has a large following. This scheme will give us a great amount of flexibility in week three to do special/occasional non Eucharist services, like Pet Services, Songs of Praise open air in the summer, whatever we can dream up to attract not just the regulars from the host village, but from across all seven villages. And your part in our new programme, is to read the church services page of the magazines, keeping your eyes open for the variations in timing.

Our 1st Sunday 'United' services which now have a well established pattern, involving the visiting preachers and the choir, together with a 'core following' of people from all seven parishes, but there is always room for more.! However, starting in January we will all be learning to sing certain parts of the Eucharist, like the Gloria, Sanctus, maybe the Kyrie's - but do not panic!, nor be put off, the choir will be singing it alone in January, and again in February so that we will have had two chances to hear it, then by March when the rest of us get to join them we will have the simple tune firmly in our minds, and the words we already know because we've been saying them for years. It is a nice modern setting and has been written especially for congregations to sing, it's not a complicated choral piece of music, and I'm sure we will all pick it up quite quickly, and if we don't like it after a trial period we will simply drop it and revert to the 'said' version we have been using.

I've heard a saying that those who sing, pray twice so this seems to me to be a good idea, and I will await your views.

The categories for 2015 are:

Team of the Year

Independent Business of The Year

This award will recognise the independent business that has been proactive in its approach to sales and customer service, has played an active role in the local community and/or has been an ambassador for the area to locals and visitors alike.

Services to the Community Award

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs, which have shown an understanding of community needs and worked to have a positive impact on the residents and/or businesses within their community. The winner will demonstrate dedication to an activity or activities that benefit the wider community or a group therein.

Community Safety Award

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs, which have taken specific action or actions to make the community safer. The winner will demonstrate an understanding of the criminal and personal safety issues facing the community and how their actions have reduced these issues or helped those affected by crime or safety violations.

Innovation Award

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs, which have created and put into action an idea, device or process that has revolutionised an element of local life. This could be a business practice, an unusual event or an invention. Judges are looking for innovations that have had a big impact and/or are extremely creative in their design and/or application.

Great & Green Award

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs, who have put in place processes, services and/or equipment to benefit the environment. The winner will be the entry that can demonstrate dedication to environmental issues through time given to green activities, a beneficial impact on the community, the way they have raised awareness of green issues through their work and the scale of the work they have undertaken.

Charity Champion

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs that have shown real dedication to raising money for good causes over the last 18 months. The winner will have demonstrated champion status through a combination of the amount of money they have raised and the time they have dedicated to fund raising activities.

Customer Focus Award

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs that value their customers and provide excellent customer service at all times. The winner will show evidence of a customer focused culture with a consistent commitment to customer service excellence, preferably with customer testimonials and/or reviews.

People Development Award

This award is open to any group or individual, including businesses, schools and clubs. The winner will demonstrate a culture that promotes learning, focusing on talent and performance as well as encouraging open communication about development needs. We've left this award wide open as we recognise that people development takes place in numerous environments and walks of life.

Health & Wellbeing Award

This award is open to any businesses, schools and clubs and will recognise organisations that can demonstrated initiatives that support employee/customer health and wellbeing. Successful entries will demonstrate an understanding of the holistic nature of health and wellbeing in their area of operation (school, workplace, voluntary group etc), how it affects their group and how they've taken steps to improve their group's health and wellbeing.

Encouraging Tourism Award

This award is open to any group, individual, business, school or club that has made a significant contribution to encourage visitors to the area or to make their experience of the area extra special. This may be for food & drink, activities and experiences, visitor attractions or through their own activities that have promoted and raised awareness of the Suffolk Coastal District as an excellent tourism destination.

SUFFOLK RED CROSS WINTER NEWS

Successful summer of fundraising.

Thank you to everyone who helped with Red Cross Week and Open Gardens this year – we raised £32,000 which is a best ever result for the County and will enable us to help approximately 1300 vulnerable people in Suffolk.

New projects

We have a number of new projects starting in Suffolk this Winter:

A 'Rucksack' service for homeless people to help them cope with winter weather, a partnership with the NHS to reduce the number of unnecessary admissions of vulnerable, older people with social care needs to Accident & Emergency departments by providing care at home,

and a first aid programme for people living at YMCA or Salvation Army Hostels (also addressing knife crime and robbery prevention). Peer education is the most successful way to reach into the homeless community.

Red Cross - get ready for winter.

Here are some ideas to help prepare for winter.

Power cuts

Do you or someone you know need extra support during a power cut? Sign up for UK Power Network's priority service on 0800 783 8838, as they can help. They have a dedicated phone number, provide regular updates and, if necessary, will ask British Red Cross volunteers to visit.

What to have at home

How long could you last without power, heat, water and a trip to the shops? Take time now to put these essential items into a kit:

- list of emergency contact numbers
- battery operated torch and radio and spare batteries (or a wind-up torch / radio)
- any essential medication, some toiletries and a first aid kit
- three days' supply of bottled water and ready-to-eat food that won't spoil
- copies of important documents, such as insurance policies and birth certificates
- pencil, paper, penknife and whistle
- spare keys to your home and car
- spare glasses or contact lenses
- if needed, baby and pet supplies.
- alternative ways to keep warm if your home heating is disrupted.
