Dear Friends

Do you pray, regularly, occasionally, only on Sunday, at times of deep need or distress? or is it something that has been 'lost' from your life over time. There can't be many adults that were not taught " hands together, eyes closed, God bless mummy etc " as young children .

Having received a letter recently from The Archbishops of Canterbury and York one sent to every serving parish priest in the country which asked that we join them in a week of prayer. I have decided to respond this challenge with a time of prayer, music, bible readings, and maybe even a hymn, each day Monday 9th – Friday 13th May in Marlesford Church starting at 4pm for approximately half an hour. Each day will be based around a different version of the Lord's prayer, one day the traditional version we all know and love, another the modern version, on another using 'Abba Father' and so on. And I would be really glad of some company.

If you are not someone who normally attends Church don't worry I promise not to 'hassle you'. If you are a member of any of my seven congregations – great, as you will know that where 2 or three are gathered together Jesus is there and will grant their requests. And as people discovered during our recent Lent course on prayer, it is often easier to pray with other people rather than trying to do it alone. It is also a good idea to sometimes try something different so these afternoons will allow us to pray using silence, and also through singing and music. You'd be most welcome to join me on one or more than one afternoon, as me singing alone in Church might not be the best of sounds to anyone passing by!.



A RIGHT ROYAL FETE

Kettleburgh fête will take place between 4:00 and 6:00 pm on Saturday 11th June in the garden of the Chequers. After last year's rain, we're hoping for better weather this time. You are probably already aware that the queen celebrates her 90th birthday this year, and fête day coincides with her official birthday, so we'll be marking the occasion by serving special teas. We'll also be repeating last year's fun dog show.

The fête is the main source of funding for the Kettleburgh village hall and St Andrew's church, and two important features of the fête are the sale of pre-loved goods and the crockery-smashing stall. For these, we need your help as usual, and are asking for your donations of:

HISTORY CORNER

AN HOUSEWIFE'S ACCOUNT BOOK FROM 1701

Mrs Pearle who was living in Stoke by Nayland in 1701, left an account of her day to day expenses giving us a insight of the life of a yeoman and his family. You will soon see that she doesn't try to be something she isn't and she obviously had a strong Suffolk dialect. (I am well aware that many people living in the villages do not originate from this wonderful county so I will do a little translating at times!)

(Note 1) I imagine this would be the local midwife carrying out the "docktors" orders. (The late lamented, Peggy Cole ,was carrying on village nursing and laying out duties in Charsfield in the 1960s)

(2) The dreaded window tax! The reason that some houses of this period have bricked up windows. There are a lot in Suffolk and it is quite fun looking for them.

(3)Hungary water was a type of perfume similar to Eau de Cologne. It was said to have been made with herbs to a recipe concocted by the Queen of Hungary in the 14th Cent. I assume Portugal water was another perfume.

It is amazing what these few items tell us about Goody Pearle and I especially like the fact that she liked a little "flutter" playing cards" We don't know if she had an husband, she certainly had children, if she did, she wasn't afraid that he would be annoyed if he saw the account! She also had a nice garden as the purchasing of terracotta pots shows.

Medical bills, as today, were high, a doctors fee being 10 times that paid to the blacksmith for a set of shoes. Fascinating stuff! (to be continued next month)
