For forty days it will remain.

St. Swithun's day if thou be fair

For forty days 'twill rain nae mair'.

A legend says that as the Bishop lay on his deathbed, he asked to be buried out of doors, where he would be trodden and rained on. For nine years his wishes were followed, but then, the monks of Winchester attempted to move his remains to a splendid shrine inside the Cathedral on 15th July 971.

According to legend, there was a heavy rain storm during the ceremony.

This is what led to the old wives' tale about St. Swithun's Day.

The emblems of St. Swithun are raindrops and apples, and there is an old saying when it rains on St. Swithun's day it is the saint christening the apples. Apple growers have St. Swithun as their patron saint...no apple should be picked before July 15th, and apples still growing on St. Swithun's day will ripen fully!

So on this lovely early summers evening, when I have laid my pen down, it is out to the garden to water the vegetables!

Whatever the weather, we are so blessed to live in this beautiful part of the world, and the rain of God's blessing is evident day by day in so many ways.

Have a happy St. Swithun's day, and whether it rains or shines on July 15th, offer a prayer of thanksgiving to God for his many mercies.

TIMES PAST

I now have the 1911 Census for Brandeston and Kettleburgh. This is in an entirely different format to the previous ones of 1841 to 1901. They were given in continuous lists which consisted of sometimes an address followed by name and surname, relationship, sex, age, occupation and place of birth.

1911 saw the record being written on a separate page or sheet for each household.

Additional information was also given. Particulars of marriage which included the length of time the marriage had lasted, the number of children born alive to the couple, how many still alive together with the number of those who had died.

More detail was also required for people over the age of 10 in employment, nationality and infirmities. The last is blocked out in my returns so that particular knowledge is not available. The number of rooms in the dwelling was also needed. All these facts were filled in by the householder who signed the return or if illiterate, helped by the enumerator, made his mark.

So far I have not had the time to do very much work on these schedules but their availability will be most useful. For example on the night of Sunday, April 2nd 1911 there were 71 households occupied in Brandeston and 65 in Kettleburgh. In both parishes there were 6 heads of households who made their mark rather than being able to sign their name. No longer were any of the 5 old workhouse cottages in Mill Lane, Brandeston occupied and probably by this time they had been pulled down. Similarly the habitations in Kettleburgh, 3 cottages known as Hungry Hall in the copse near the Gun Club were no longer in existence.

Time will tell what other discoveries are made.
